LITURGICAL CALENDAR ITEMS

THE SOLEMNITY OF THE MOST HOLY BODY AND BLOOD OF CHRIST (CORPUS CHRISTI)

Sunday, June 7, 2026

All Parishes, Religious Houses, and Institutions where the Blessed Sacrament is reserved are asked to schedule a period of solemn exposition and adoration on *Corpus Christi*. Parishes, if possible, are also encouraged to have a Eucharistic Procession.

Exposition and a procession with the Most Blessed Sacrament follow the norms found in the ritual book, *Holy Communion and the Worship of the Eucharistic Mystery Outside Mass (Revised 2024)*. It is also possible to have exposition and a procession with the Most Blessed Sacrament on a day near to the Solemnity, in anticipation or to recall its observance.

THE TWELFTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME AND FATHER'S DAY

Sunday, June 21, 2026

An intention in the Universal Prayer and the possible use of the *Prayer over the People* found in the *Book of Blessings*, nos. 1729-1733, provides for a suitable liturgical inclusion of Father's Day. Without prejudice to the liturgical and biblical texts of the day, the homily may also include a promotion of Christian fatherhood.

ANNIVERSARY OF THE DEDICATION OF THE CATHEDRAL BASILICA OF SAINTS PETER AND PAUL

Tuesday, June 30, 2026

This commemoration is observed all throughout the Archdiocese of Philadelphia with the celebration of the Eucharist and the Liturgy of the Hours (in all places). Inside the Cathedral Basilica, this observance is a Solemnity. Outside of the Cathedral Basilica, this observance is a Feast.

TIME OF THE EASTER VIGIL 2027

The Easter Vigil is the first Mass of Easter Sunday and is not in any way to be considered an Anticipated Mass for Easter Sunday. **This is why the discipline of the Church insists**

that it should not begin before nightfall in any circumstance. It may be helpful to know that sunset, according to a variety of models, occurs approximately at 7:20 PM on March 27, 2027. This information is provided at this time to assist with calendar planning for 2027. In general, given the variable date for Easter, it seems best to schedule the Easter Vigil each year for 8:00 PM or later.

CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS

The Office for Divine Worship has the responsibility for direction, guidance and support of pastors and those who collaborate with them in the formation of adults for Christian Initiation. Additional information on Christian Initiation for adults can be found on the website for the Office for Divine Worship, under the heading *Christian Initiation*.

PLEASE NOTE

Full Sacramental Initiation—Baptism, Confirmation and the first Reception of Holy Communion—apart from the Easter Vigil, outside of the immediate danger of death, requires the permission of the Archbishop (see OCIA, no. 331). Archbishop Perez delegates the Office for Divine Worship to give this permission. Please contact the Office for Divine Worship for such circumstances.

If there are any questions about the celebration of Baptism in unusual or irregular circumstances, please contact the Office for Divine Worship.

LITURGY OF THE HOURS

IN GENERAL

- Two publishers have been chosen to print the four volumes of the Liturgy of the Hours – Ascension Press and Word on Fire.
- The publishers have announced that they will begin accepting pre-orders on July 1, 2026.
- The volumes will be released gradually (the same happened in 1975).
- The first volume to ship will be Volume II – Lent and Easter seasons.
- Each volume will be shipped approximately one month before its permitted first use date.
- It is anticipated that digital and one volume editions will be available by the First Sunday of Advent 2028.
- Mandatory use for the revised translation of the Liturgy of the Hours is the **First Sunday of Advent 2028**.

A TIMELINE

DATE	ACTION
July 1, 2026	Publishers may accept pre-orders. They will take orders for all four volumes, even though they will ship in increments.
January 2027	Volume II (Lent and Easter) ships
Feb 10, 2027	Volume II may be used (Ash Wednesday)
April 2027	Volume III (Ordinary Time Weeks 1-17) may be shipped
May 17, 2027	Volume III may be used (Monday after Pentecost)
July 2027	Volume IV (Ordinary Time Weeks 18-34) may be shipped
August 1, 2027	Volume IV may be used
October 2027	Volume I (Advent-Christmas) may be shipped
November 28, 2027	First Sunday of Advent -- Volume I may be used
2028	Digital editions, one volume major extracts, and minor extracts
December 3, 2028	FIRST SUNDAY OF ADVENT – MANDATORY USE

“Once that [four-volume] process is complete, work will turn to the review and publication of the one-volume major extracts; they are expected to go on sale in mid-2028. In addition, various minor extracts of the Divine Office—General Instruction of the Liturgy of the Hours, Daytime Prayer, Compline, etc.—will be published at some point during 2027 or 2028” (Father Dustin Dought, Executive Director, BCDW Secretariat).

WORKSHOPS FOR LITURGICAL MINISTERS

If a parish or institution conducts its own workshop for Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion, please contact the Office for Divine Worship to obtain the mandate letters from the Archbishop of Philadelphia for the new Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion.

EXTRAORDINARY MINISTERS OF HOLY COMMUNION

GENERAL NORMS

- **All Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion, without exception, are to have a current appointment letter from the Archbishop.**

- **Extraordinary Ministers who serve in institutions and schools throughout the Archdiocese are typically commissioned for service in their parishes and likewise commissioned for service in the institution and/or school.**
- Candidates are to be fully initiated practicing Catholics, high school graduates, not in an invalid marriage, recognized for faith and devotion to the Holy Eucharist as well as for service in the parish/institution/school. Pastors/chaplains are reminded to be discerning in the invitation to members of the lay faithful to carry out this ministry.
- Pastors and chaplains are encouraged to send new Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion to the archdiocesan formation and training sessions. Letters of Appointment from the Archbishop will then follow. *Veteran Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion are also welcome to attend.*
- Pastors and chaplains are reminded to inform the Office for Divine Worship if they conduct their own formation and training as well as to send to this office their request for new Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion. Request forms can be found on the Office for Divine Worship website. Letters of Appointment from the Archbishop will then follow.
- Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion are appointed for a three-year term and for the place where they are commissioned. Terms may be renewed if agreeable to both the pastor/chaplain and the Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion. All records of active Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion are maintained by the parish/institution/school.
- **Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion are commissioned after participation in a formation and training session, according to the form found in the *Book of Blessings*, Chapter 63, "Order for the Commissioning of Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion."**
- Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion **only** serve in the parishes/institutions/schools for which they are commissioned.

GUIDELINES FOR THE BUILDING AND RENOVATING OF CHURCHES AND CHAPELS IN THE ARCHDIOCESE OF PHILADELPHIA

The Archdiocese of Philadelphia, in addition to what is described in the liturgical ritual books, follows the guidelines of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops for the building and renovating of churches and chapels. These guidelines are found in the

USCCB document, *Built of Living Stones: Art, Architecture and Worship*, 2007, Fifth Printing, revised.

GUIDELINES FOR CHAPELS IN RECTORIES

The Office for Divine Worship, according to the Archdiocesan Policy Manual, has oversight for Chapels in Rectories. Pastors are asked to review these guidelines for compliance. Please direct any questions or concerns about chapels in rectories to the Office for Divine Worship.

DISPLAY OF FLAGS IN CATHOLIC CHURCHES

There are no regulations of any kind governing the display of flags in Roman Catholic Churches. Neither the Code of Canon law, nor the liturgical books of the Roman Rite comment on this practice. As a result, the question of whether and how to display the American flag in a Catholic Church is left up to the judgment of the diocesan bishop, who in turn often delegates this to the discretion of the pastor.

The origin of the display of the American flag in many parishes in the United States appears to have its origins in the offering of prayers for those who served during the Second World War (1939-1945). At that time, many bishops and pastors provided a book of remembrance near the American flag, requesting prayers for loved ones – especially those serving their country in the armed forces. This practice has since been confirmed in many places during more recent conflicts.

The Bishops' Committee on the Liturgy has in the past encouraged pastors not to place the flag within the sanctuary itself, to reserve that space for the altar, the ambo, the presidential chair and the tabernacle. Instead, the suggestion has been made that the American flag be placed outside the sanctuary, or in the vestibule of the Church together with a book of prayer requests. It remains, however, for the diocesan bishop to determine regulations in this matter.

RECURRING INFORMATION

THE PRAYER TO SAINT MICHAEL, THE ARCHANGEL

Many parishes and institutions within the Archdiocese of Philadelphia pray the prayer to Saint Michael in conjunction with the celebration of Mass. You are reminded that this devotional prayer is to take place outside of Mass. It is not to be prayed as the concluding prayer of the Universal Prayer nor as part of the Communion Rite.

TIME FOR VIGIL MASSES AND ANTICIPATED MASSES

The time for Vigil Masses and Anticipated Masses in the Archdiocese of Philadelphia is no earlier than 4:00 PM. This applies to Holy Days of Obligation as well, including Christmas.

THE MASS SCHEDULE FOR HOLY DAYS WHEN THE OBLIGATION IS SUSPENDED

In the United States, there are three Holy Days, Solemnities, when the obligation to participate in Mass is suspended when the observance falls on a Monday or a Saturday—the Solemnity of Mary, the Holy Mother of God (January 1), the Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary (August 15), and the Solemnity of All Saints (November 1). In these instances, the Mass schedule certainly can be modified. However, there should be the celebration of one Mass at least for the benefit of the faithful who desire to attend Mass.
